Brazil – Aug/Sept 2018

Summary

We visited Brazil in August and September of 2018 with goals of seeing some new primates, new birds, and especially good encounters with a Giant Anteater. This was our 2nd trip to Brazil. In September 2016 we went to see Jaguars and visit the Southern Pantanal. All travel this time was arranged directly with the various lodges and guides. Here was our itinerary:

- Fly USA to Sao Paulo
- 3 nights Fazenda Bacury (private bird guide)
- 1 night Campo Grande
- 4 nights Fazenda Baia das Pedras (private guide)
- 4 nights Barranco Alto (private guide)
- 1 night Campo Grande
- 2 nights Arena Copacabana Hotel, Rio (private bird guide)
- Fly Rio to USA
- Drink many Caipirinhas along the way

The weather this time was much different than two years ago. It varied from hot, to cool, to cold and rainy and back to hot. The mixture of weather probably helped from a wildlife viewing perspective. For some reason, the ticks liked me on this trip and didn't really care for anyone else. I got them on me at all locations except for Rio.

Overall, the trip was exceptional. We saw pretty much everything we wanted to see and had multiple great encounters with a Giant Anteater including one with a pup.

Fazenda Bacury:

We hired Carlos Henrique to be our bird guide for our time at Bacury. He was recommended by Carlos Leoncio the owner at Fazenda Bacury. Carlos was not only an outstanding guide but a great guy to hang out with. He is also a herpetologist and knows his mammals pretty good as well. He is highly recommended for anyone looking for a guide in the Sao Paulo area and can be reached via his website: www.carduelis.bio.br/

The food at Fazenda Bacury was varied and every dish was superb. Carlos Leoncio and his wife were delightful to talk with and were excellent hosts. The grounds were large and filled with bird life. And, of course, the Atlantic Forest was fantastic to hike and drive in. We were a bit disappointed to not see the Southern Muriqui but seeing the Capuchin and Marmosets made up for that.



Fazenda Baia das Pedras:

Our guide for BdP and Barranco Alto was the incomparable Stefan Grol (<u>http://www.stefangrol.com/</u>). Stefan is knowledgeable about all the flora and fauna of the Pantanal, is great company (he likes bad puns like me) and is an exceptional artist as well. He is usually booked through the lodges but can be contacted directly as well.

Rita and Carlos have built a thriving fazenda that is very authentic. But, what they have done for wildlife in the Pantanal is truly exceptional. Not only have they protected 13,000+ hectares of land but they have gone above and beyond in their support for the research of Giant Armadillos and Tapir. These two research teams alternate 2 week expeditions to BdP where Rita and Carlos not only have built them a lab for their research but also furnish them with rooms and meals. All free of charge. These two teams are the foremost experts in the world on these two wonderful species. Rita and Carlos are responsible for that. During our stay, Patricia was there with the Tapir team and we got a chance to talk to her a bit about Tapirs which was fantastic. Unfortunately, we didn't see one during our stay but we have seen them before in a previous trip to the Pantanal.



Fazenda Barranco Alto

The wildlife at BA was once again tremendous. We saw no Tapirs this time but so many Giant Anteaters and the experience with "Clawdia" was one of our best wildlife encounters ever. The many Six-banded Armadillos were also a highlight as were all the spectacular birds. It really is an amazing place.

The staff (Stefan, Claudia, and Lydia) were tremendous as always. There is nothing they won't try to do for you if you asked and they are all fascinating to talk with.

The new managers Ben and Corrine were nice but we only met Corrine briefly. Ben was around a little but they do have two young kids so they can't be with the guests at all times. The best thing is that they really haven't changed anything in the two years since our last visit. It is mostly all top notch and I would recommend a visit in a heartbeat to any nature lover.



Rio de Janeiro

For our two days in Rio, we booked Ricardo Barbosa from Pica-Pau Tours (ricbrazil@hotmail.com). Ricardo is a birding guide but grew up in Rio and knows the city like the back of his hand. So, he took us to a couple can't miss tourist sites including Tijuca National Park and we hired him to take us to the Golden Lion Tamarin reserve outside of Rio.
