# **Borneo** Kuching

In August 2024, I had the fantastic opportunity to attend the World Congress of Herpetology in Kuching, Borneo. While the trip was primarily focused on herpetology, I still managed to spot a few mammals. The first week was quite hectic due to the ongoing conference, but I still found time for a night walk in Kubah National Park. Since many other conference attendees had the same idea, the forest was fairly busy, which didn't exactly create ideal conditions for spotting mammals. Apart from a brief glimpse of a civet that disappeared into the canopy, there was little else to see in terms of mammal sightings. But from a reptile-watching perspective, it was absolute paradise. With so many sharp-eyed herpetologists around, very little went unnoticed. In the span of just a short walk, we came across several individuals of Sumatran pit viper (Trimeresurus sumatranus), Bornean keeled green pit viper (Tropidolaemus subannulatus), Bornean anglehead lizard (Gonocephalus borneensis), Giant forest dragon (Gonocephalus grandis), and Green crested lizard (Bronchocela cristatella). And towards the end of the trail, we were even lucky enough to spot Doria's anglehead lizard (Gonocephalus doriae) and Black-lipped forest dragon (Pelturagonia nigrilabris).

There's also a small pond in this area that is said to be home to over 60 frog species. I only managed to spot a handful, including the **Copper-cheeked** frog (*Chalcorana raniceps*), **Dark-eared tree frog** (*Polypedates macrotis*), **Harlequin flying frog** (*Rhacophorus pardalis*), **Kajau flying frog** (*Feihyla kajau*), and the fascinating **Long-nosed horned frog** (*Pelobatrachus nasutus*).

The following day brought us to an equally incredible site along **"Temple Road,"** where we encountered a fantastic range of species: **Malayan vine snake** (*Ahaetulla mycterizans*), **Banded Malaysian coral snake** (*Calliophis intestinalis*), **Borneo bow-fingered gecko** (*Cyrtodactylus consobrinus*), **Smooth-scaled bow-fingered gecko** (*Cyrtodactylus pubisulcus*), **Cat gecko** (*Aeluroscalabotes felinus*), **Green crested lizard** (*Bronchocela cristatella*), **Giant forest dragon** (*Gonocephalus grandis*), and **Bornean anglehead lizard** (*Gonocephalus borneensis*). Among mammals, we recorded just one species again – the tiny <u>Plain pygmy squirrel</u> (*Exilisciurus exilis*).

After the conference, I spent two nights at the **Matang centre**. Setting aside the rather odd zoo, it turned out to be a great spot overall – affordable accommodation in a cabin surrounded by forest trails. Right on the cabin's terrace, we observed <u>fruit bats</u> of the genus *Cynopterus* (*Cynopterus sp.*).



Along the nearby trails, we came across a good number of **Dark-headed forest dragons** (*Gonocephalus liogaster*), **Dusky earless agamids** (*Aphaniotis fusca*), **Borneo bow-fingered geckos** (*Cyrtodactylus consobrinus*), **Kendall's rock geckos** (*Cnemaspis kendallii*), **White-banded bent-toed geckos** (*Gekko albofasciolatus*), **Brook's skinks** (*Tropidophorus brookei*), and the **Black-headed cat snake** (*Boiga nigriceps*).

The following day, we set off on a boat trip to **Santubong** with the hope of spotting proboscis monkeys and <u>Irrawaddy dolphins</u> (Orcaella brevirostris). Unfortunately, we weren't lucky enough to see any proboscis monkeys. And while we missed the proboscis monkeys, we did get a good look at a rather impressive **Saltwater crocodile** (Crocodylus porosus), which definitely made up for it. On our way back to the city, we made a stop at the Kampung Budaya Sarawak, where we had better luck. We spotted <u>Silvered langurs</u> (Trachypithecus cristatus), <u>Plantain squirrels</u> (Callosciurus notatus), and even a <u>Sunda colugo</u> (Galeopterus variegatus) resting surprisingly low in the trees.

Before heading off to our next destination, we naturally made a stop at the **Semenggoh Wildlife Centre**, where we had the chance to see several o**rangutans** (*Pongo pygmaeus*) in their semi-wild habitat.

# **Borneo** Kota Kinabalu

After arriving in **Kota Kinabalu**, our main goal was to explore Kinabalu Park and to try and find the iconic **Kinabalu anglehead lizard** (*Hypsicalotes kinabaluensis*). Unfortunately, despite our best efforts, we weren't able to spot it. Still, we encountered several fascinating species in the area. Among them were the **Smooth-headed forest dragon** (*Pelturagonia cephalum*), the *Kinabalu bent-toed gecko* (*Cyrtodactylus baluensis*), and a real highlight – the **Malcolm's pit viper** (*Trimeresurus malcolmi*), an endemic species to this region. Right at the entrance to the summit trail, we also observed several **Black-banded squirrel** (*Callosciurus orestes*) running around begging for treats from tourists.

We then continued on to **Poring**, which, besides its hot springs, is also home to the well-known herping spot Lupa Masa. Personally, I found it a bit underwhelming – we actually saw far more wildlife in the park surrounding the hot springs. In the evening, while walking along a stream, we came across a <u>Tuft-tailed rat</u> (*Trichus fasciculata*), but unfortunately, we weren't able to get a photo. At the botanical gardens, we spotted a small group of L<u>ong-tailed macaques</u> (*Macaca fascicularis*) and a <u>Prevost's squirrel</u> (*Callosciurus prevostii*). During a guided walk through Lupa Masa, we came across a Sumatran pit viper (*Trimeresurus sumatranus*) and several Giant forest dragons (*Gonocephalus grandis*). In the end, the herping turned out to be quite decent after all – right next to our accommodation, we spotted a Equatorial spitting cobra (*Naja sumatrana*) and a Bornean keeled green pit viper (*Tropidolaemus subannulatus*).

## **Borneo** Brunei

To the end of our journey, we headed to **Brunei**, choosing the capital city, **Bandar Seri Begawan**, as our final destination. With no time left to visit a national park, we didn't have high hopes in terms of wildlife watching – but the city turned out to be a surprisingly rewarding stop. Early in the morning, we managed to arrange a water taxi at the harbour, which took us out into the mangroves in search of **Proboscis monkeys** (*Nasalis larvatus*). They were quite shy, vanishing into the canopy almost immediately, but we still managed to spot a few at last. The experience was so affordable compared to Kuching that we repeated the trip the next day.

Back at the harbour, we also observed <u>Long-tailed macaques</u> (*Macaca fascicularis*) resting in the trees.

That evening, we tried our luck at **Tasek Lama Recreational Park**, conveniently located within walking distance from our hostel. Besides several **Oriental garden lizards** (*Calotes versicolor*) and a single **Oriental whip snake** (*Ahaetulla prasina*), something shimmered in the treetops – to our surprise, it turned out to be a <u>Philippine slow loris</u> (*Nycticebus menagensis*). We definitely hadn't expected that! During the day, the park turned out to be full of **Water monitors** (*Varanus salvator*), many of them impressively large in size.

What I regretted most was not seeing any tarsiers, but at least that gives us a perfect reason to return to Borneo someday.

# Singapore

To end the trip on a high note, I planned a three-day stopover in Singapore. Originally, it was meant to be just a one-day layover before my flight back to Europe, but after a bit of research into what the local parks had to offer, I decided to change my plans — and I'm so glad I did.

During my first afternoon and evening walk around **Upper Pierce Reservoir**, I encountered several <u>Lesser mouse-deer</u> (*Tragulus kanchil*), large groups of <u>Long-tailed macaques</u> (*Macaca fascicularis*), <u>Plantain</u> <u>squirrels</u> (*Callosciurus notatus*), <u>Horsfield's flying squirrels</u> (Iomys horsfieldii), Slender squirrels (*Sundasciurus tenuis*), and even a <u>Common</u> <u>palm civet</u> (*Paradoxurus musangus*).


On my second night, I went on a night walk through **Thomson Nature Park**, and the number of animals I saw was absolutely unmatched. I came across several <u>Lesser mouse-deer</u> (*Tragulus kanchil*), multiple <u>Sunda colugos</u> (*Galeopterus variegatus*), and a <u>Common palm civet</u> (*Paradoxurus musangus*). From a herpetological perspective, the area was full of life. Perched right on the railing were not just one, but several **Wagler's pit vipers** (*Tropidolaemus wagleri*), as well as multiple **Oriental whip snakes** (*Ahaetulla prasina*) and several sleeping **Green crested lizards** (*Bronchocela cristatella*). Among the birds, I also spotted a **Brown hawk-owl** (*Ninox scutulata*).

During my visit to the Singapore Zoo, I even spotted a <u>Lesser short-nosed</u> <u>fruit bat</u> (*Cynopterus brachyotis*) resting in a pavilion. While walking through the Botanic Gardens, I saw more <u>Plantain squirrels</u> (*Callosciurus notatus*), <u>Slender squirrels</u> (*Sundasciurus tenuis*), and a lively <u>Common</u> <u>treeshrew</u> (*Tupaia glis*).

Even in the final few hours before my departure, when I simply went to relax in **Pasir Ris Park**, a tip from a group of birders led me to a roosting pair of **Spotted wood owls** (*Strix seloputo*).

I was slightly disappointed not to have seen a Oriental pied hornbill (Anthracoceros albirostris) or the local smooth-coated otters (Lutrogale perspicillata), but that was more than made up for by an encounter I had barely dared to hope for.

I had heard it was possible to see a <u>Sunda pangolin</u> (*Manis javanica*) in Singapore, and thanks to a local wildlife enthusiast who shared a few secret tips, I managed to find one. I promised not to share the exact location – and so I won't – but it was one of best meetings I ever had.
