Uganda, 7-19 June 2025

In June 2025, Phyllis and Robert Crawford and Bruce Dyer from South Africa undertook an eleven-day trip to Uganda, arranged by Harrier Tours, to look for mammals and birds. Their excellent driver/guides were Joel and Brian. This brief report concentrates on the mammals but includes photos of several birds. As the Crawfords (including Peter and David) had seen Gorillas and Chimpanzees in 1996, and trekking permits are expensive, these mammals were not searched for in 2025. We arrived at Entebbe International Airport via Addis Ababa, and Kigali, early on Sunday 8 June and left from the same airport early on Thursday 19 June.

List of mammals seen (based on *Illustrated Checklist of the Mammals of the World*, CMW, 2020) – the volume, page and number for each species are indicated, together with places of observations. Locations are: MS Mabamba Swamp; MF Murchison Falls National Park; SE Semiliki National Park; KI Kibale Forest National Park; QE Queen Elizabeth National Park; BW Bwindi National Park surrounds; LM Lake Mburo National Park; NF Nabugabo Forest. Mammals seen for the first time are highlighted in green.

Brief notes: We were collected early at Entebbe and taken by a small boat to see Shoebill and other birds at Mabamba Swamp. We then transferred to Elephant View Lodge, just outside Murchison Falls National Park (MFNP), for two nights. Our day in MFNP produced a wealth of mammals, including Patas Monkey, and birds. At night, we saw a Rusty-spotted Genet in the lodge's garden. On day 3, we drove to Bumaga Camp in Semiliki National Park, where two Dent's and several De Brazza's Monkeys were observed early the next morning near the hot springs. We then walked a forest trail and briefly saw two Semiliki Red Colobus following a troop of Guereza Colobus. Lord Derby's Scalytailed Squirrel was shown to us in a hollowed-out tree nest known to the guides. Grey-cheeked Mangabey and Red-tailed Monkey were plentiful. As per the suggestion on Harrier Tours' web page we spent four nights at Kibale (first at Guereza Safari Lodge; next 3 at Kibale Forest Lodge). We spotted there on the last three of these nights, first at Bigodi Swamp, where we saw Demidoff's and Thomas's Dwarf Galagos and East African Potto. The local guide told us it was unusual to see these three species all on the same night. Our second night of spotting was from a vehicle along a dirt road through forest and moorland, the highlight being sighting a Weyn's Duiker. On our third night, Gloden Cat and African Palm Civet remained big targets. The local guide suggested spotting on foot around maize fields near Bigodi Swamp. However, we chose rather to drive along the tarred road that runs east from the main road between Kibale Forest Lodge and Fort Portal at Nkingo (see map below). Our rationale was that we would cover a much greater distance by vehicle and that an open view of the road and its verges, as well as spotlighting on both sides of the forest, would greatly increase the area covered. We were fortunate to see dwarf galagos, a Spectacled Lesser Galago, and an African Palm Civet (all in trees). Finally, while returning (ca. 23h00), we got a good view of a Golden Cat on the ground just inside the forest edge, 1-2 km from the main road. In ensuing excitement, one of the guides jumped out and banged a door. Otherwise, the cat may have ventured onto the road verge thus allowing photos to be taken. However, just seeing it was fabulous. Day 8 was spent driving to and in Queen Elizabeth (QE) National Park. We stayed at QE Bush Lodge, which Giant Forest Hog, but not Red River Hog, visited after dark. The next day we saw red Forest Buffalo on the bank of the Kazinga Channel opposite the hotel, presumed Forest Elephant while passing Maramagambo Forest (features matched CMW description), and Uganda Topi near Ishasha airfield. Trouble with our vehicle's front wheel meant we were unable to spot near Ruhija that night, so we were pleased to have seen Spectacled Lesser Galago at Kibale but missed Black-fronted Duiker. We enjoyed watching two Common African (White-bellied) Pangolins foraging in a natural, pre-release section of forest at Pangolin Rescue Camp while the wheel was being fixed, and saw an East African Civet while driving from there to Gorilla Mist Camp. The wheel gave more trouble next day so we arrived late at Arcadia Lodge, Lake Mburo and unfortunately missed the night drive. The next day we saw many mammals and birds in the park. A troop of Angola Colobus greeted us on our arrival at Nabugabo Forest at about 15h00. We had a short rest at a hotel near Entebbe Airport before leaving at 01h30 for the airport to get our return flight.




