INTRODUCTION

WITH SANGEETA SAHAYA

Dear All,

After a wonderful pioneering adventure to the Congo Basin this past December with a group of stalwart Chalo guests, we are delighted to offer a slightly new version of this trip for July 2026. I hope that you will consider joining us to explore the tributaries and hidden channels of the mighty Congo River as it reveals its secrets to us...

From the point of view of charismatic wildlife, this trip includes 2 (yes 2!) gorilla treks of habituated lowland gorillas, a bonobo trek for that most rarefied of all great apes, a visit to the extraordinary Sangha Baï for its vast gatherings of forest elephants (whilst also praying for bongos and red river hogs), an agile mangabey trek, night walks for nocturnal animals like pottos and pangolins, and should you choose to do the Gabon extension, then your trip will also include another elusive primate – the mandrill,

other rainforest primates, **3 species of crocodilians** and **great flocks of resident & migratory birds** like African River Martins, Rosy Bee Eaters and African Grey Parrots.

In terms of cultural interactions, I can honestly tell you that the experiences you can expect on this trip are without parallel. You will meet the **Ba'aka forest people** and enjoy their sensational 'water drumming' and explore their forest home with them. You will go kayaking among mangrove forests on a 'black river', receive an audience from the **Queen of the Téké** Kingdom, participate in fishing village activities, enjoy **traditional dances like the Kébé Kébé** and meet the famous **Congolese 'Sapeurs' or the Congo Dandies**. Tourism is at a nascent stage in this area still, so your interactions will be authentic.

Our trip takes you from the upper reaches of the Sangha River to the Alima River, and from there to the mighty Congo itself. With the Gabon extension, it takes you all the way down to the Atlantic Coast. It is a deep dive into the heart of Africa, intended for experienced adventurers who wish to discover these remote corners of our planet in safety and comfort.

The wildlife-heavy sections of this trip consist of the time we spend in Dzanga-Sangha (CAR), Nouabalé-Ndoki NP (ROC), the bonobos (DRC) and Lopé & Loango (in Gabon), the latter being offered as an optional extension.

The week spent cruising on the Congo river will be focused primarily on enjoying the historic nature of sailing in the footsteps of Stanley and de Brazza and the cultural insights we get from the villages and people we meet en route.

The Congo basin is a region of thick rainforests, shy wildlife and you should not expect to see the animal densities you see in East Africa or southern Africa.



INTRODUCTION

We are targeting the very best areas and best wildlife experiences that are possible in this environment, but if you have some interest in the history, geography and people of Central Africa, then you will find that this trip makes for a comprehensive amalgam of flora, fauna and cultures. The riverbanks of the Congo and its tributaries are not teeming with wildlife, but you will find that the riverscapes are drop-dead gorgeous, and its elusive wildlife species are awe-inspiring.

Before signing up, please remember that this is an expeditionary trip at its heart. Yes, a very comfortable expedition no doubt, but the daily programs are not set in stone, and we ask for your flexibility and understanding if things don't always


follow the daily itinerary to the letter.

We will divide our trip into 2 groups of 12 each, with one group starting from Brazzaville and the other starting from Bangui. Everyone will then come together for the cruise on the riverboat and end together in Brazzaville. These groups of 12 will be further sub-divided into sub-groups of 4-6 guests, so that none of the activities feel overwhelming, either to us or to the wildlife we wish to see. In addition to the descriptive itinerary, we thought it might be helpful to also provide it in chart format for more clarity, so you can choose the routing that works best for you, on a first-come basis.

INTRODUCTION



WITH KEITH BARNES

South African by birth, but a globetrotter by persuasion, Keith's first love was dragonfly larvae, before mammals and birds became a driving obsession. An ornithologist by training, author, and seasoned wildlife tour leader, he is renowned for his extensive contributions to bird conservation across Africa. Barnes has led numerous expeditions throughout the continent, guiding enthusiasts and professionals alike to some

of Africa's most remote and biodiverse regions.

Keith earned a PhD in African lark taxonomy and evolution from the Percy FitzPatrick Institute of African Ornithology at the University of Cape Town. His academic work includes pivotal roles in launching the first Important Bird Areas (IBA) of Southern Africa program - including publishing the initial directory, as well as revising the threatened species assessments and coordinating the Red Data Book in 2000 for BirdLife South Africa.

His research interests encompass evolution, ecology, and the intricate interactions within biological systems. In addition to his scientific endeavors, Barnes is an author and co-author of several acclaimed field guides, including *Wildlife of Kruger National Park* and *Field Guide to Birds of Greater Southern Africa*. These works are celebrated for their accessibility and comprehensive coverage, making them invaluable resources for both novice and

experienced naturalists.

He has also co-authored **Wildlife of** Madagascar, Wild Rwanda and Birding **Ethi**opia, further solidifying his expertise in African wildlife. His latest endeavor was **Habitats of Africa**, which delves into the continent's varied habitats and ecosystems, their wildlife, and the varied mechanisms that drive them. Barnes emphasizes deep ecological understanding and expert guidance. He enjoys leading tours that are designed for those who have experienced traditional safaris and are now seeking a more profound connection with the natural world, and the usual and odd enigmas that inhabit it. The focus is on rare species and unique ecosystems, often in remote and under-visited areas.







DEEP DIVE INTO THE TRINATIONAL SANGHA

The Triparks Area or the Tri-National Sangha consists of:

- Lobeké (Cameroon)
- Dzanga Ndoki & Dzangha-Sangha (CAR)
- Nouabalé Ndoki (Republic of Congo)



In the north-western section of the Congo Basin, at the meeting point of Cameroon, CAR and ROC, lies an enormous tract of land, made up of 3 contiguous national parks in 3 different countries.

Together, this protected area of over 750,000 hectares, harbors a wealth of flora and fauna, including considerable populations of forest elephants, lowland gorillas, forest buffalo, antelopes like bongo, duikers and sitatunga, as well as a host of other primates, including chimpanzees.





- Participants will be divided into 4 subgroups, plus guides, and each sub-group will do all the activities in Dzanga-Sangha and Nouabalé Ndoki parks on a revolving basis.
- Each person will spend 3 nights at Sangha Lodge: they will each do 1 gorilla trek (age permitting), they will visit Sangha Baï, Baï Hokou (for the agile mangabey trek) and participate in some cultural interactions with the local Ba'aka people.
- Each person will spend 3 nights in Nouabalé-Ndoki NP: they will overnight on the platform at Wali Baï. The plan is to spend a second overnight on Mbeli Baï (provided the construction of the platform has been completed). Mbeli Baï is special for its views of wild gorillas and elephants, often sharing the same space & 1 night at Mondika camp and do a gorilla trek here as well (age permitting).

- Each person will spend 1 night camping on an island on the Sangha River.
- If Mbeli Baï is not ready for visitors by July 2026, then we will visit Lobéké NP in Cameroon for a hike there instead.

The 4 nights spent between Sangha Lodge and the river boat will be rough and rustic. We will provide as many comforts as possible, but please note that you will be mobile camping in the rain forest, sleeping on folding cots, and using a dry toilet that has been set up underneath the platform for your use. There will be shower facilities with a bucket of water for the time spent at Nouabalé Ndoki.

I believe that this gives you a wonderfully authentic and immersive rainforest experience and this constitutes a highlight of the trip for me personally, but please ensure that you have understood this section well before signing up for this adventure. Bonobo Tracking in Tshumbiri, DRC



The village of Tshumbiri is 180kms upriver from Kinshasa, south of Mbandaka, and the **bonobo conservation project is in an area called Mbou Mon Tour.**

Here is a very **realistic first-hand description of the bonobo trek** by Chalo guest @Kit Boey:

It is pitch black at 3.30am but the camp is already alive with people getting ready to jump into the jeeps for an early dawn trek for the main event in the Mbou-Mon-Tour in Nkala in the Democratic Republic of Congo to see the endangered Bonobos.

Once described as the pygmy chimp, the bonobo gained its full species status in 1929. This fourth of the 4 African great apes is found only in the Democratic Republic of Congo, not the easiest place to navigate into. Bonobos occur only in the south of the Congo River. The wide fast-running river draws an impenetrable line between the two great apes - the chimpanzees and its very close cousins, the

bonobos. In a gist, while the chimpanzees are larger, have a male-dominant society and show stronger aggressive and violent characteristics, the bonobos are smaller with groups that are led by females, and adopt a "copulation" strategy to resolve disputes. One theory is that bonobos occupy areas that have abundant productive trees and there is less need to compete for food, which probably resulted in less aggression in the bonobos.

We leave the camp after 3.30am for about an hour's drive to the forest. We are again split into two groups. The "slow" group includes the older folks (us!), which is given the easier bonobo family to follow as the grounds there are generally flat. The "fast" and younger group will track the other bonobo family which is roosting in a more difficult terrain of hills and marshes. In darkness with only our head torches lighting a narrow path, we stumble along a trail that is sometimes hidden by

overgrown bushes. After about 45mins or perhaps longer, we reach the nests where the bonobos had spent the night. They are on the move.

In the low morning light, we can just about make out the bonobos at the tops of the tall trees, several of which pause and watch us curiously. My photos are almost unsalvageable because of the low light. The bonobos slide down the trees and move on the ground. We are split into two groups, one group immediately tries to follow them, the other group, including my pauses to check out a video that Mick takes of the bonobos moving down the trees. We finally walk again through the thick forest, climbing over fallen trees, squeezing between vines and trying to avoid being caught by the tough vines on the forest floor. We find the first group but they are stopped by marshy and wet grounds. The lead tracker tries to find another way but comes up against a fast-flowing stream. We decide we have seen enough and we aren't sure if we can follow fast enough as the bonobos. It is a long way out, climbing a hill but finally finding the trail we had been on

As we near the vehicles, suddenly the "fast" group comes walking in. They had been trying to search for the bonobos for nearly three hours without success and were wading through mud and marshes. They finally gave up and decided to try our bonobo family. Thank goodness they did find the bonobos.

And thus, we finally joined the rarefied group of fewer than 1,000 people outside the local residents in the world to have seen bonobos in the wild.

The Radisson Brazza is a well-appointed chain hotel, with decent rooms and the usual amenities. Tonight, we will enjoy a welcome dinner at Mami Wata, one of Brazza's better-known restaurants. Such a nice way to start the trip with a dinner on the banks of the mighty Congo, and the lights of Kinshasa twinkling on the far bank of the river.

Our meals will be prepared by our own chef from the boat, so of high quality. The hotel has wifi in selected areas only.

DAY 10: JULY 12, 2026:

ALL ABOARD THE PRINCESS NGALESSA – beautiful maiden of the Congo!



We will get an early start this morning - transfer by bus from Ouesso to Oyo (about 5 hours by road), embark on the Princess Ngalessa, check into our rooms and then gather in the common lounge/dining room for lunch and our safety briefing by the ship's captain. We will then start cruising down the Alima River, on our way to join the Congo.





DAY 15: JULY 17, 2026:

TSHUMBIRI – BONOBOS!

This bonobo trek is one of the highlights of our trip.

Bonobos are the most difficult of great apes to track, not least because they are only found on the DRC side of the river, where logistics, facilities and politics make the effort extremely challenging. Well, that is, until now

Instead of having to take a pirogue or small motorboat upriver or drive over non-existent roads through extremely difficult terrain from Kinshasa, we can now dock our boat parallel to the bonobo tracking site and go there directly. The transport cars are still ramshackle, some of us will need to be transported to the site on motorbikes, but we now have the possibility of visiting these rare apes with relative ease and joining a small group of people who have seen bonobos in the wild.

About the accommodation for the bonobo trek: we will either go to the trailhead directly from the Princess Ngalessa, or we will need to overnight at the project campsite, in tents and huts, with only basic facilities. Spending the night on the boat will certainly be more comfortable, but this is still being sorted out in terms of logistics, and we may not be able to do this. If that's the case, please be prepared for 1 very basic and rustic overnight experience here.

There are 3 groups of reasonably well habituated bonobos at Mbou Mon Tour. We will spread the tracking across the habituated groups.

DAY 16: JULY 18, 2026:

TSHUMBIRI – BONOBOS - A HOLY GRAIL FOR WILDLIFERS!



Once they wake up, bonobos are fast moving apes that jump and glide along the forest canopy with great ease and very quickly. To follow them is to also move quickly over marshy terrain and very thick vegetation.

Consequently, fitness levels are important here. You MUST be in reasonably good shape physically to do this trek, and since a lot of the trek is done in the pre-dawn hours, you must be able to see reasonably well with a headlamp as you start your trek. If you cannot walk at a brisk pace, you will not be able to keep up with the fast-moving bonobos. Please assess your fitness levels realistically before joining the trek.

For those choosing to opt out of the trek, we will devise alternative activities, including birdwatching from our skiffs, lectures on board etc.

DAY 17: JULY 19, 2026:

NGABE – MEETING THE QUEEN OF THE TEKE & KEBE KEBE DANCE



This was one of the experiences that I had personally been a bit iffy about initially, thinking it might be both intrusive and contrived. But in fact, this meeting with the Téké Queen was one of the cultural highlights of the trip, and I recommend it heartily. There is much to learn about Congolese culture from icons such as the Queen. She does things as she will, so you may have a long audience with

her, or a short audience, but either way, definitely worth the effort.

Likewise, the Kébé Kébé dance at Ngabe village. Their drumming is tremendous!

VISAS

You only need to obtain an ROC visa for this trip. For those of you that have no embassy in your country of residence nor a country nearby that can handle this ROC visa, we will arrange your visa on arrival paperwork for you at an extra cost.

For everyone else, please arrange to get your physical visas stamped in your passports from the ROC embassy near you.

The Triparks system allows for people with a visa from the ROC to visit the sister parks in Cameroon and CAR on the same visa. For the bonobo visit in the DRC, we will organize the authorization as well, so no additional DRC visas are required.

For those taking the Gabon extension, you will need a Gabonese visa. Visas on arrival can be arranged for all guests at an extra cost, or you can apply for a sticker visa from the Embassy of Gabon in your country of residence. The Gabonese e-visa option is iffy at best & we don't recommend it.
