This tour can only run in September and April as the trip visits the north and south of the vast expanse of Argentina and the weather in both regions is very different at the same time to year. As a result there is very little time where the favourable conditions for both areas (and mammalwatching) are to be found.

But other than the group tour we have advertised we can look to arrange private tours. However these will be expensive for private groups of less than 5 people.

The plan is to run this group tour annually, starting in September 2027 onwards, but due to the specialist nature of such dedicated mammalwatching tours we are never sure of the exact level of interest but we hope to run the trip annually and so if the dates above are not suitable for you then we can look to dates in the future; just let us know and we can add you to our mailing list for this specific trip.

If you wish to book a private tour and tailor this itinerary we can also look into that option. In doing so we would have flexibility for the duration of trip you would like to book.

Some of our clients prefer to book longer trips to South America and visit some of the other locations here for wildlife or anything else.

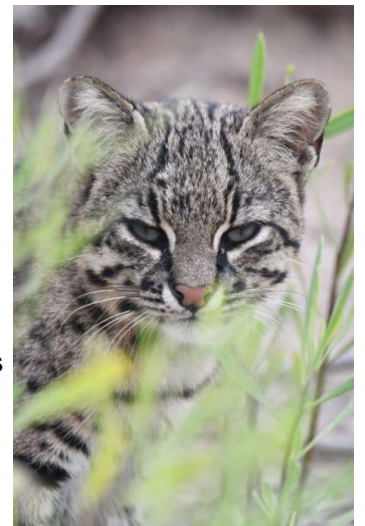
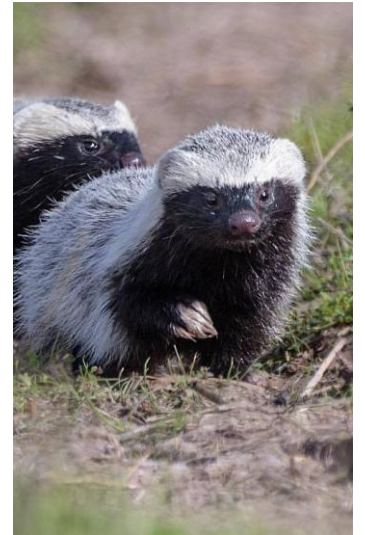

Tour Information

Introduction

Argentina is one of the world's largest countries and being a "long" country north to south, there is a huge range of climates and ecosystems. This in turn means there is a huge wealth of wildlife to be found here, but up until recently Argentina has not been a major mammalwatching (or even wildlife watching) destination. Yes people would visit as a stopped off point to visit the sub-Antarctic islands and Antarctica itself and Peninsula Valdes has always been popular with whale watchers; but the vast tracks of pampas, mountain ranges, tropical and subtropical forests and rugged coastlines have been largely unexplored by mammalwatchers.

That has all started to change in the last few years, no little part due to the finding of one of the continent's best guides and a very enthusiastic mammalwatching convert, Marcelo Gavensky.

Royle Safaris has worked with Marcelo and other wildlife guides in Argentina for years and this itinerary is the work of love and passion a long time in the making.

We have decided to base the tour around seeing some of South America's most underrated species, the northern and southern Andean huemel (species of deer) endemic to the Southern Cone of South America. Once we decided on this we had the basis of a route and in visiting both the northern and southern parts of Argentina we started to develop stop offs in many places which are hotspots for range restricted and endemic mammals.

The trip will be visiting habitats and areas where well over 100 species of mammals have been seen, we don't expect to see 100 species but 50+ is a definite target for this trip and among these dozens of species are there some very cool ones including Geoffroy's cat, South American sea lion, franciscana, southern monito-del-monte, lesser grison, Wolff's mountain viscacha and many more. With some luck we could find an amazing 11 species of armadillo, 7 species of tuco-tuco and 9 species of cat. However to see all 9 species of cat would require unbelievable luck.

All in all we are happy to announce this new itinerary, to showcase the very best of Argentine mammalwatching and hopefully start to fully integrate Argentina into the mammalwatching community.

Itinerary

Day 1 **Buenos Aires / Jujuy** *Arrival & Travelling & Wildlife Watching*

Accommodation:

Refugio Las Tarucas (Eco Lodge)

Food:

Lunch and dinner included today, they will be at the accommodation or nearby restaurants. Sometimes a packaged lunch / dinner will be taken into the field.

Transportation:

Private vehicles & Domestic flight.

We will require everyone already being in Buenos Aires the night prior to the trip starting, the reason being that we don't know the time of the flight we will take from here to Jujuy today. There is a chance it will be early and so we will need to have everyone arrived and in Buenos Aires available for an early morning departure.

We will also prefer everyone to be at the same hotel, we will be able to provide the name and address of the hotel we recommend prior to the trip.

Once everyone has been collected from the hotel in Buenos Aires we will go to the airport to catch the flight to Jujuy (2.5 hours), on arrival we will meet our driver and drive to the Refugio las Tarucas (1 hour). This is a private property in yungas grassland which has been dedicating itself to the preservation of the endangered northern Andean huemul deer. This means the place is an excellent place to start this trip and see this amazing species well.

Day 2 **Refugio las Tarucas / Purmamarca** *Wildlife Watching & Travelling*

Accommodation:

Refugio Las Tarucas (Eco Lodge)

Food:

All of the meals will be served at the lodge or we may take a packed lunch / dinner into the field.

Transportation:

Private vehicle & Walking.

Today will be a full day in the Refugio las Tarucas and the surrounding areas as we look for closer views of the northern Andean huemul and other mammals here.

Other animals which can be seen around here include peccaries, gray brocket deer, screaming hairy armadillo, pampas fox, northern colocolo, guanaco and then after dark we will try and find some rodent and opossum species if we have some luck some of the high altitude species could be seen today.



We will come back to the lodge for meals or possibly taking packed meals into the field, we will be spending a lot of time in the field today (as we will on many other days during this trip).

Day 3 **Refugio las Tarucas / Purmamarca** *Wildlife Watching & Travelling*

Accommodation:

TBC nearer the time (3-4* Hotel)

Food:

Breakfast will be served at the Refugio with lunch either also here or in the field and dinner at a restaurant in Puramarca.

Transportation:

Private vehicle & Walking.

This morning we will have one more morning at the Refugio las Tarucas to look for more wildlife and then we will leave in the afternoon and visit a mountain pass called Cuesta de Lipan, here the high altitude grasslands can result in sightings of some mammals, as well as Andean condors. We will drive and stop and scan the areas here to see what we can see with high altitude species being our main targets such as guanaco, vicuna, pampas foxes and maybe, if we are lucky northern colocolo and puma we will also be looking for white-bellied grass mouse and southern highland yellow-toothed caviés.

We will then overnight in the village of Purmamarca, this location is stunning in its own right with the multi-hued mountain called the Seven Colours Hill right in front of the village.

Day 4 **Purmamarca / Ecoportal de Piedra** *Travelling & Wildlife Watching*

Accommodation:

Ecoportal de Piedra (Eco-lodge)

Food:

Breakfast will be served at the hotel with lunch en-route and dinner at the lodge.

Transportation:

Private vehicle & walking.

Today day we will connect Purmamarca (in the Humahuaca valley) with Ecoportal de Piedra, a private reserve and lodge located in the Austral Yungas Forest.

However before leaving, we will look for common mountain viscacha in the Humahuaca Valley, and then on the way to Ecoportal de Piedra, we will have chances to see brown agouti and montane guinea pigs.

When we arrive at the Ecoportal de Piedra we will explore the Yungas forest and Sierran Chaco forest habitat here in search of a host of mammals in this very diverse ecosystem. Targeted species will include buff-bellied fat-tailed opossum, southern tamandua, hooded capuchin, common tapeti, forest tuco-tuco, crab-eating raccoon, crab-eating fox, lowland tapir and no less than six species of felines: ocelot, margay, northern oncilla, Geoffroy's cat, jaguarundi and puma (and occasional Jaguars can be seen here as they travel across the area). However seeing these cats will require a good amount of luck, but we will be spending a couple of nights here, we will have reasonable chances of seeing some of these attractive species.

Day 5 **Dry Chaco Forest**

Wildlife Watching

Accommodation:

Ecoportal de Piedra (Eco-lodge)

Food:

Breakfast and lunch will be on the road and dinner back at the Ecoportal.

Transportation:

Private vehicle & Walking.

Today we will make a full day excursion from Ecoportal de Piedra to visit the Dry Chaco forest habitat. Our key targets here include Chacoan mara, lowland yellow-toothed cavy, and a high diversity of xenarthrans, including six-banded, southern three-banded, Chacoan naked-tailed and even greater fairy and giant armadillos (this last two are extremely hard to find anywhere) and giant anteater, which is also rare but inhabits this area.

We will return in the evening and spend time tonight around Ecoportal de Piedra looking for more wildlife.

Day 6 **Ecoportal de Piedra / Mendoza**

Travelling

Accommodation:

Mendoza Hotel (TBC)

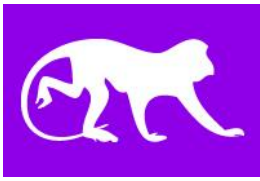
Food:

Breakfast will be served at the Eco-portal with lunch en-route and dinner at the hotel in Mendoza.

Transportation:

Private vehicle & Domestic flight.

Today is mainly a travelling day, as we will be connecting north-west Argentina with Mendoza (central west Argentina), although we will have chances of seeing some more mammals in the NW as we drive out from Ecoportal-



tal de Piedra, and we will have our first chances of seeing some of the Mendoza specialties, such as the puma. Depending on the flights we may have some time today in Villavicencio Natural Reserve today, we will maximise the time available to us to try and find some more mammals after arriving here.

Days 7-8 Villavicencio Natural Reserve

Wildlife Watching

Accommodation:

Mendoza Hotel
(TBC)

Food:

Breakfast and dinner will be at the hotel in Mendoza with a packed lunch in the field.

Transportation:

Private vehicle.

These two days will see us spend the entire days looking for pumas and other wildlife in Villavicencio Natural Reserve. Here we will have real chances of seeing other attractive felines, such as northern colocolo and even the rare Andean mountain cat. Other mammal targets over these days include Uspallata chinchilla rat and common mountain viscacha.

Day 9 Mendoza / Ceibas

Travelling & Wildlife Watching

Accommodation:

Ceibas Hotel /
Lodge (TBC)

Food:

Breakfast will be served at the hotel in Mendoza with lunch en-route and dinner at the accommodation in Ceibas.

Transportation:

Private vehicle &
Domestic flight.

Today we will transfer from Mendoza back to Buenos Aires with a flight and then after arriving back in the capital we will travel north and spend the rest of the day looking for mammals in the Parana River Delta north of Buenos Aires; specifically we will be exploring the Espinal forest of southern Entre Ríos province.

Our targets here include big lutrine opossum (very hard to find but present in the area), Brazilian white-eared opossum, mesopotamian fat-tailed opossum, southern nine-banded armadillo, naked-soled conyrat, crafty marsh rat, Argentinian swamp rat, Brazilian guinea pig, coypu (for once in its native habitat), marsh deer (which is locally endangered), Molina's hog-nosed skunk and Geoffroy's cat, among others.

Day 10 El Palmar National Park

Wildlife Watching

Accommodation:

La Aurora del
Palmar (Eco
Lodge)

Food:

Breakfast will be served at the accommodation in Ceibas with lunch en route and dinner in El Palmar.

Transportation:

Private vehicle.

El Palmar National Park is one of the best mammal watching destinations in central Argentina, and here we will be looking for some of the targets mentioned for the day before (especially Geoffroy's cat, which is more likely to be seen in this protected area) and many others, such as greater capybara (which is abundant in this park), plains viscacha, brown brocket, crab-eating and pampas foxes, crab-eating raccoon, six-banded armadillo and the endangered Rio Negro tuco-tuco.

This park also offers good chances of seeing lesser grison, a species that we will be looking for every day while we are in the Argentine Pampas.

Day 11 El Palmar / Buenos Aires

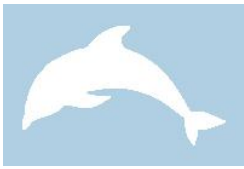
Breakfast will be served in El Palmar with lunch en-route and dinner at the hotel in Buenos Aires or a nearby restaurant.

Transportation:

Private vehicle.

Today we will be travelling back south to the capital but along the way we will have chances of seeing many of the species mentioned for Day 9 and Day 10.

Once we arrive back to Buenos Aires we will then rest in the hotel before continuing on our mammalwatching adventure tomorrow.



Day 12 **Buenos Aires / Samborombon Bay** *Wildlife Watching & Travelling*

Accommodation:

Refugio El
Manantial (Eco
Lodge)

Food:

Breakfast will be served at the hotel with lunch either
also here or in the field and dinner at a restaurant in
Manantail.

Transportation:

Private vehicle &
Walking.

This morning we will depart the city and head southwards and to grasslands which are home to 3 species of armadillos (southern long-nosed, large hairy and screaming hairy) as well as other species such as Geoffroy's cat, pampas fox, Brazilian white-eared opossum, big lutrine opossum, lesser grison, Talas tuco-tuco and many species of small rodents, including small vesper mouse, one of the smallest rodents of South America.

We will arrive here and explore the area in the afternoon and at night to have a look to see what we can find.

Day 13 **Mar Chiquita** *Travelling & Wildlife Watching*

Food:

Breakfast will be served at Manatial with lunch en-
route and dinner at a nearby restaurant.

Transportation:

Private vehicle.

This morning we will have breakfast at Refugio El Manantial before continuing the journey south and roughly along the Atlantic coast to Mar Chiquita. Along the way we will stop in San Clemente del Tuyú and visit a special reserve which has nearly all of Argentina's population of the critically endangered pampas deer; also here live Geoffroy's cat, lesser grison, Talas tuco-tuco and other typical species of this region.

From here we will continue onto the coast and the little town of Mar Chiquita, where we will have our first chances of seeing Franciscana dolphins, scanning from the shore this afternoon.

Day 14 **Mar Chiquita** *Wildlife Watching*

Accommodation:

Breakfast will be served at the guest house with lunch
and dinner in nearby restaurants.

Transportation:

Private vehicle &
Private boat.

Today we will be praying for good weather / sea conditions as we have a boat trip planning to look for the small dolphin species Franciscana which is endemic to the coastline of northern Argentina and southern Uruguay. During this time of the year we may also see southern right whales, South American sea lions and South American fur seals, and even a southern elephant seal around the coast here.

After the boat trip we will continue exploring the nearby grasslands around Mar Chiquita looking for lesser grison, as well as visiting a private reserve to keep trying for big lutrine opossum, crafty marsh rat, armadillo species and small vesper mouse as well as many other species which could be possible here.

Day 15 **Necochea / Buenos Aires** *Travelling & Wildlife Watching*

Accommodation:

Cyan Americas (4*
Hotel)

Food:

Breakfast will be served at the guest house with lunch
and dinner in nearby restaurants.

Transportation:

Private vehicle &
walking.

Today we will start early so we visit Necochea in the south, before heading back to the capital. Necochea is a small port town on the coast where there is a resident colony of South American sea lions as well as South American fur seal, located in the harbour.

Sometimes, individual southern elephant seals can be seen here as well if we are lucky. When we are here we will also try our chances for dune tuco-tuco in the nearby sand dunes, where this endangered species still thrives in pockets of habitat in the town.

From here we will then head back on the highway to Buenos Aires (approximately 7 hours), and once we get back there we will have the night in the city hotel to rest, before we start the next stage of our mammal exploration of Argentina when we head to Patagonia.



Day 16 Bariloche / Puerto Blest

Travelling & Wildlife Watching

Accommodation:

Hotel Puerto Blest
(4* Hotel)

Food:

Breakfast will be served at the hotel in BA with lunch en-route and dinner in Puerto Blest.

Transportation:

Private vehicles,
Domestic flight,
Ferry & Walking.

This morning we will be transferred to the airport to catch a morning flight to Bariloche in the Andes. After arriving in this beautiful mountain town we will travel straight to Puerto Blest via a ferry across the stunning Patagonian setting of Lago Nahuel Huapi.

Once we arrive in this idyllic location (there are few more beautiful settings for rare mammal watching in the world), we will check into where we will be spending the next two nights looking for the endemic species of the Valdivian forest.

After dark we will be out in the forests here looking for southern monito del monte (very good chance for), the rare long-nosed shrew opossum, Valdivian long-clawed mouse, kodkod and southern pudu, among many other species – including a good number of rodents which could be seen here.

Also culpeo fox is relatively common here, and we will also have chances of seeing the endangered southern river otter, although it's a rare species and hard to see.

Day 17 Puerto Blest

Wildlife Watching

Food:

All of our meals will be served at either the restaurant in the hotel or the nearby campsite's restaurant.

Transportation:

Walking.

Today will be a full day around Puerto Blest, the day time is free time as the mammals are all nocturnal here. There is a good selection of birds here, including many Valdivian specialities and in the skies over the mountains there are often some Andean condors soaring.

Then after dark we will be out looking for the mammal life of the forests here.

Day 18 Bariloche / El Calafate

Breakfast will be served in Puerto Blest with lunch en route and dinner in El Calafate

This morning we will leave Puerto Blest on the morning ferry and travel back to Bariloche where we will be transferred to the airport to catch our flight to El Calafate further south in Patagonia.

This afternoon in the surroundings of El Calafate will look for guanacos, and visit Hoya del Chingue to look for Magellanic tuco-tuco, South American gray fox, and try our chances with southern colocolo.

Day 19 El Chalten

Breakfast will be served at the hotel in El Calafate with lunch en-route and dinner at the hotel in El Chalten

Transportation:

Private vehicle &
walking.

This morning we will transfer from El Calafate to El Chaltén where we will be based for a couple of days in our search for more mammals.

When travelling across the Patagonian Steppe, to El Chaltén we will have chances of seeing guanacos and smaller mammals such as Humboldt's hog-nosed skunk, pichi and even the rare Patagonian weasel.

Once we have arrived in the El Chaltén area, we will focus in the search of south Andean huemul, an endangered species that can be seen in Los Glaciares National Park or private ranches nearby.

There are also chances of seeing puma, and in a canyon near town there is a small population of Wolffsohn's mountain viscacha, which we will try to see in early morning or late afternoon while we stay in El Chaltén



Day 20 **El Chalten**

All of your meals will served at the accommodation or nearby restaurants in between excursions into the wilderness.

Today is a full day in this area to increase our chances of finding the endangered and scarce south Andean huemul as well as a wealth of other species around here.

Day 21 **El Calafate**

Breakfast will be served at the accommodation in El Chalten with lunch en-route and dinner at the hotel in El Calafate.

Transportation:

Private vehicle & walking.

This morning we will leave El Chalten and travel back to El Calafate, along the way we will try again for some of the Patagonian Steppe targets mentioned for Day 19.

Then when we get to El Calafate we will make an afternoon visit to Perito Moreno Glacier (one of the most impressive Patagonian landscapes and a stunning place which we cannot miss) and of course try our chances for mammals crossing the road along the way, we will then enjoy our final dinner of the trip.

Day 22 **Hoya del Chingue / Buenos Aires**

Breakfast will be served at the hotel in El Calafate and is the only meal included today.

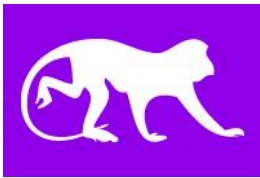

This final morning on this mega mammal trip to Argentina will again visit Hoya del Chingue, but this time at a better time of the day to look for Magellanic tuco-tuco and, hopefully, a southern colocolo visiting the tuco-tuco's colony. We will then be taken to the airport to catch the final flight of the trip, which is back to Buenos Aires. You will arrive in the late afternoon and so you need to arrange your return flight home for the night or tomorrow (however there are no services included today once you arrive back int Buenos Aires).
