Madagascar has always represented a frontier of the unknown and the strange for biologists and naturalists. As the fourth largest island in the world, there are many reasons any naturalist would hope to visit it someday. For 90 million years Madagascar has remained in isolation, and in its solitude it has allowed an incredible amount of diversity and endemism to evolve. Of the estimated 200,000 species of living organisms around 150,000 are endemic to the island, an incredible 75%!

While our birding tour focuses on taking people to more heavily visited national parks since this is oftentimes the best option for seeing as many endemic birds as possible. For those that want to experience the iconic landscapes, rarer animals and less tourists, this tour is for you. The entire premise of the “Enigmatic Wildlife Tour” is to

visit locations most other tours will not, and to search for animals that our other tours have little or no chance of seeing. We started in the north where we visited several national parks and preserves. Some of our highlights included **Sandford's Brown Lemur**, **Ankarana Dwarf Lemur**, **Amber Mountain Rock Thrush**, and **Common Tenrec**. Another major highlight was the critically endangered **Perrier's Sifaka**, one of the world's 20 most endangered primates. Then we traveled to the central western coast in search of Madagascar's elusive carnivores (**Fosa** and **Bokiboky**) and one of the island's strangest mammals, the **Malagasy Giant Jumping Rat**. Throughout the trip we struck gold with several rarely encountered mammals like the **Coquerel's Giant Mouse Lemur** (*photo below by David*) and the **Golden Trident Bat**.



By the end of the tour our mammal list reached a total of **51 species**; where we saw a member from **7 of the 8 endemic mammal families!** We saw **30 lemur species, 3 euplerid species, 3 tenrec species, 11 bats species, and 4 rodent species.** We had **98 species of birds**, including at least one species from each of the endemic bird families. Our birding highlights included **White-breasted Mesite, Velvet Asity, Pita-like Ground Roller, Amber Mountain Rock-Thrush, Cuckoo Roller, Long-billed Bernieria, Hook-billed Vanga (photo below by David), Short-legged Ground Roller and Coquerel's Coua.** Some of the botany highlights included **all 6 species of endemic Baobabs**, an epic group to complete on this trip! The reptile diversity was also well represented with a total of **46 species, 14 of which were endemic chameleons!** We managed to find **11 species of frogs** along the tour, including the highly sought after **Baron's Mantella.** Overall it was an epic trip with many memorable encounters, so be sure to read on for all the wonderful details of this epic adventure. *The report will be organized based on locality rather than a day-to-day report.*



Montagne de Francais

Our first day of the tour began with a flight from the country's capital of Antananarivo to Diego-Suarez. We received a proper Malagasy flight experience, which included a 2 hour delay and a plane change after boarding. While nowadays this is atypical, however it still happens more regularly than other countries so be prepared if you join us on a future trip. Upon arrival in Diego-Suarez we immediately left for Montagne de Francais. This reserve is the best place to see one of Madagascar's rarest baobabs, the **Diego-Suarez Baobab** (*Adansonia suarezensis*). Luckily trees don't move so we managed to find it along with **Gray Baobab** (*Adansonia madagascariensis*) after a 30 minute walk through the park. Along the way we saw **Malagasy Kestrel**, **Souimanaga Sunbird**, **Madagascar Martin**, **Elegant Skink**, **Bernier's Striped Snake**, and **Oustalet's Chameleon**. Our time in the park was brief but productive, after finding our target baobabs we reloaded the vehicle and continued to Amber Mountain NP.

Amber Mountain National

Park

Founded in 1958, Amber Mountain National Park became Madagascar's first national park. The park sits on an ancient volcanic massif and protects 182 km² of montane rainforest. Due to the microclimate effect from the elevation change there is a high level of endemism tied to the forests of Amber Mountain, our goal was to see as many of those endemics as possible. We had a total of two nights in the region, which would give us plenty of time to explore the unique biota of the area. During the two night hikes we managed to find most of our major targets; **Arnhold's**



Mouse Lemur, Amber Mountain Dwarf Lemur, Amber Mountain Leaf Chameleon, Amber Mountain Blue-nosed Chameleon, Amber Mountain Chameleon, Petter's Chameleon and Amber Mountain Leaf-tailed Gecko. Some less expected but equally exciting finds were **Antakarana Leaf Chameleon, Madagascan Black Widow, and Commerson's Leaf-nosed Bat (Photo by Christine).**

During our day visits to the park we hiked several trails and roads. Along the way we did quite a lot of birding as we searched for our lemur targets. Some of the best birds we saw were **Madagascar Pygmy Kingfisher**, **Cuckoo Roller**, **Madagascar Buzzard**, **Hook-billed Vanga** and the absolutely stunning **Pitta-like Ground-Roller**. An epic and completely unexpected find was an **Amber Mountain Brook Snake** which I found while looking under logs along the trail! Further down the road we came across a gorgeous **Eastern Malagasy Tree Boa**, an epic find. After several dedicated hours of searching we finally connected with the highly endemic **Amber Mountain Rock-Thrush**, which was split from **Forest Rock-Thrush** a few years ago. We managed to find two major northern lemur targets, the **Crowned Lemur** and **Sandford's Brown Lemur**. With both of these seen and photographed well we focused our efforts on a different type of endemic Malagasy mammal, the **Ring-tailed Vontsira** (*Photo by David*).



This beautiful little orange predator appears similar to a mongoose but is actually a member of the euplerid family, a group of carnivorans endemic to the island. Half the group saw two of these fierce beasts as they suddenly appeared in front of us on the first day but the participants further down the trail missed out. For the last afternoon and next morning we focused our efforts on finding another **Ring-tailed Vontsira**.


On the final morning we hiked to a nearby waterfall, a place the **Ring-tailed Vontsira** sometimes frequents. We spotted **Malagasy Kingfisher**, **Mascarene Martins**, and had epic looks of a **White-throated Rail** as it foraged along a creek in the open to our delight. In the last 10 minutes of the hike I finally spotted a **Ring-tailed Vontsira** watching us from the nearby brush. The curious beast then leaped out onto the trail and inspected everyone before bounding off into the forest. A great end to our time here! On our way to the next destination we made a quick pitstop to see **Perrier's Baobab** (*Adansoinia perrieri*), our third of the six Malagasy baobabs.

Andrafiamena Andavakoera Private Reserve


Our next stop of the trip was two nights in Andrafiamena Andavakoera Private Reserve. This reserve is incredibly important as it serves as one of two strongholds left for the **Perrier's Sifaka**, one of the world's 20 most endangered primates. Our first priority was to see this vanishing lemur, so we headed out early on the first morning. These sifaka are visually unique as they are the only all black sifaka species, which is where their other common name of "**Black Sifaka**" comes from. The hikes can be strenuous here for older participants; with lots of ups and downs on the trail and quite intense heat and humidity. If you plan on joining us for a future trip don't forget breathable clothes and hiking poles. Thanks to the dedication of the local guides we found these rare lemurs on

the first morning, after a few hours of hiking. We watched several **Perrier's Sifakas** forage and leap across the canopy of the forest. We also came across more **Crowned Lemurs**, which offered much better looks than the previous days. Not long after we found both **Ankarana Sportive Lemur** (*Photo by Rob*) and **Daraina Sportive Lemur**, one of the only places in Madagascar where there are two sympatric sportive lemurs!

With all of our diurnal lemur targets seen by lunch time we allotted some time for exploring the local bats. The preserve is home to an incredible cave system, which several bats call home. First we made a stop at the local school, where a teacher let us in to check the ceiling for roosting bats. We found 9 **Grandidier's Lesser Free-tailed Bats** in the school, an awesome



addition to the life lists. Afterwards we headed out to the cave where we managed to see thousands of one of Madagascar's most stunning bats, the **Golden Trident Bat!** This massive colony was visible from outside the tight channels in the cave, making access

much easier to this gem. The very tight caves provided us with two additional bat species; **Griveaud's Long-fingered Bat and Rock-loving Sheath-tailed Bat.**


The intense rains this year greatly affected our ability to get out every night, though a few of us still managed to go out for at least an hour most nights. It rained very heavily both nights in Andrafiamena Andavakoera Private Reserve, however we still had many highlights. Our reptile highlights included **Garamaso Leaf-tailed Gecko, Panther Chameleon, Mossy Leaf-tailed Gecko, Northern Madagascar Velvet Gecko, and Northern Pencil Snake.** The mammal highlights were also fantastic, we saw **Tavaratra Mouse Lemur, Ankarana Dwarf Lemur, and Commerson's Leaf-nosed Bat.** The mammal highlight of our time here was a chaotic view of the **Common Tenrec**, a lifer for everyone on the trip including myself!

Camp Tattersalli

After seeing all of our major targets the previous day I decided to make an extra activity proposal to the group. At an extra expense we could all embark on adding 3 hours to the day's drive to see the stunning and critically endangered **Golden-crowned Sifaka** in Daraina. It seemed like a no-brainer to the group, and we all agreed to the extra car time and expense. We left by 7:00am, and arrived in Daraina by 10:30am. Usually the road to the **Golden-crowned Sifaka** is straightforward with some classic Malagasy road conditions, however unfortunately rains had washed out a section of it the previous night meaning we had to walk the last 2.5 km to the camp where the lemurs were. We all agreed and on the way we saw birds like **Madagascar Green Pigeon**, **Malagasy Coucal**, and **Namqua Doves**. Storm clouds formed quickly and by the time we were about to get the lemurs the skies opened up. It began dumping rain so we hurried to the

camp where we took shelter and had lunch underneath. Luckily the **Golden-crowned Sifakas** were also in the parking area and we got great looks from several of them immediately. The rain continued and we began to fear that getting back down the road could be difficult so we began walking back to the cars. In just the short amount of time since the rain had started we experienced several flooded areas which meant we needed to get our feet wet. The worst of the minor floods was where we initially had to leave the cars, as it now resembled a small river. We waited for 20 minutes since the rains had stopped and the water levels were beginning to drop. Once we felt it was safe to cross, all the guides assisted the tour participants one by one across the knee deep “road river”. Seeing the **Golden-crowned Sifakas** was certainly not as easy as it was the previous year, but the group maintained a positive attitude and were able to adapt to the unexpected difficulties. Flexibility and adaptability are requirements on the 8th continent, luckily the group had both!

Ankarana National Park

Ankarana National Park is home to one of several tsingy formations in Madagascar. The tsingy are one of the most unique and visually stunning landscapes in the world. These limestone karst formations have eroded into needle-like protrusions from the rocks, creating a harsh and hypnotizing phenomenon. The park here is home to over 100 species of birds and dozens of mammals, with the expansive cave systems being home to 14 bat species. We had two nights to explore the region and so we hit the ground running the first morning after a long and tiring day in Daraina. The hike to the tsingy took a few hours as we traversed over rocks and through forests.

Along the way we spotted birds like **Madagascar Cuckoo**, **Greater and Lesser Vasa Parrots**, **Long-billed Bernieria**, and **Broad-billed Roller**. The butterfly activity here was some of the best of the trip. We saw species like **Common Leopard**, **Yellow Pansy**, **Madagascar Forest Nymph**, **Lang's Short-tailed Blue**, **Madagascar Graphium**, and **Blue-spotted Swallowtail**. One of the coolest finds was a terrestrial forest crab, known as **Malagasy Freshwater Crab!** After a long but beautiful hike we arrived at the tsingy, where everyone took in the views of this alien landscape.

One of the most marvelous features of this national park is the extensive and stunning system of caves. Due to erosive components of limestone formations the caves here are massive and complex. As a result of the cave richness in the region there is a high diversity and density of bats, a total of 14 species have been recorded in the park. After

lunch we went to explore two of these caves. The first cave was home to a colony of hundreds of **Malagasy Straw-colored Fruit Bats**. The second cave was home to a higher diversity. We found **Griveaud's Long-fingered Bat (Photo by Christine)**, **Commerson's Leaf-nosed Bat**, **Rock-loving Sheath-tailed Bat** and **thousands of Madagascar Rousettes**. Aside from the bats we came across dozens of massive **Ornamental Wandering Spiders**, an endemic spider which is the sole member of the family Viridasiidae, and an insanely **massive tarantula (*Encyocrates raffrayi*)**. The night hikes were heavily impacted by the rains but we did manage to go on one night hike during our two night stay. We saw **Taravatra Mouse Lemur**, **Plated Leaf Chameleon**, **Northern Madagascar Leaf-toed Gecko**, and **Panther Chameleon**. The biggest surprise during this night walk was a roosting **Eleonora's Falcon!**



Nosy Be

Nosy Be is one of the most visited locations in Madagascar from its beaches and resorts, however we were here for its forests and lemurs. The rains continued to impact us, and I got word the previous day that the two bridges on the way from Ankarana to Ankify port were washed out. This meant our method of transportation needed some adjustments. Rather than a straight forward three hour drive to Ankify we drove to the first bridge washout where we crossed on foot over a smaller foot bridge. Then another vehicle picked us up, drove us to the second bridge washout where we crossed over using a motorized canoe. We got into another vehicle and then made it to the port of Ankify, where we got into our last boat. The ride was about an hour, taking us through beautiful aqua marine seas decorated by tropical forested islands. We saw several **Lesser Crested Terns** on the way. When we arrived in Aniky we drove to our beautiful hotel and had

lunch before our afternoon and night walks. Our journey to Lokobe was certainly an adventure. We started with a wet boarding when we walked out to our boat, we then cruised along the tropical coast to a local community reserve. We got our feet wet again as we walked the shore and then into the forest, it's a good idea to bring water shoes. The forests here are home to several target lemurs and reptiles, with our biggest priority being the stunning **Black Lemur** (*Photo by David*). It only took five minutes after landing to find them! It was a long journey but standing in the presence of 9 **Black Lemurs**, some within a few feet only, as they foraged made it all worthwhile. We stayed with the lemurs for 20 minutes as we watched a variety of different behaviors; from infant care and playing to



foraging. We then continued along the trails to find some nocturnal lemurs and reptiles. We eventually found our first **Nosy Be Sportive Lemurs**, an incredible tiny **Minute Leaf Chameleon**, and an enormous **Madagascar Ground Boa**. We continued our search for **Claire's Mouse Lemur**, but never managed to find one. Luckily we still managed to see over ten **Nosy Be Sportive Lemurs**. We took the next morning off before our flight to relax after a long day. We flew from Nosy Be to Antananarivo, took the rest of the day, and then flew to Moronodava the next day.

Kirindy

After our flight to Morondava it was an easy 30 minute drive to one of Madagascar's most famous locations, **Baobab Alley** (*Photo below by David*). Baobab Alley is one of Madagascar's most photographed and easily recognized locations, and for a good reason too. While the surrounding habitat is gone, the local groves of baobabs support three of the six Malagasy baobab (*Adansonia* sp.) species. The most famous of the three is **Grandidier's Baobab** (*Adansonia grandidieri*), which is the predominant species in the main grove. After stopping to see the main **Grandidier's Baobab** grove we continued down the road and picked up the other two local baobab species, **Za Baobab** (*Adansonia za*) and **Fony Baobab** (*Adansonia rubrostipa*). Within 20 minutes we had seen the last of the six endemic baobab species. As we marveled at the baobab's beauty we picked up **Sakalava Weavers, Olive Bee-eaters, and Black Kites**. After, we completed the trip and headed 2 hours down the road to Akiba Lodge.



We had two nights ahead of us in the area, with plenty of targets to look for. The first afternoon was very productive. We saw **Red-fronted Brown Lemur**, **Verraux's Sifaka**, **Coquerel's Coua**, **Madagascar Buttonquail**, and **White-headed Vanga**. We ventured through the forests and found our biggest bird target in the area, the **White-breasted Mesite**. We had an incredible encounter with four of them as they foraged, it's quite special to see these ancient and unique birds. This was already the fourth endemic bird family we'd seen, with only the asities left! Throughout the two days we had several epic encounters with one of Kirindy's coolest residents, the **Bokyboky**. Also known as the **Narrow-striped Mongoose**, these euplerids were both shy and accommodating and gave us many different kinds of encounters. However the highlight for everyone here was the **Fossa**. On our second and final mornings we had incredible views of a young

Fossa moving around the main parking area. Seeing three of Madagascar's carnivores is not an easy task, certainly one of this tour's greatest accomplishments. Other animals we encountered during the days were **Giant Coua**, **Madagascan Giant Hognose Snake**, **White-browed Owl**, **Rufous Vanga**, **Common Tenrec**, **Madagascar Blue Vanga**, and **Sickle-billed Vanga**.

Our nights were amazing as well, and we all appreciated begging out of the rain for a few nights. The first night was spent trying to find the **Malagasy Giant Jumping Rat**, but instead we saw **Gray Mouse Lemur** and **Western Big-footed Mouse**. The second

night most of the group wanted to focus on lemurs, however one client went to retry for the **Malagasy Giant Jumping Rat**. The group found all our major nocturnal lemur targets; **Pale Fork-marked Lemur, Gray Mouse Lemur, and Red-tailed Sportive Lemur**. An unexpected bonus was a **Greater Hedgehog Tenrec**, which was hiding in a small log. The solo side adventure was successful and the client saw the **Malagasy Giant Jumping Rats!** The majority of the group was ready for bed, but one person went on a late night walk for some of the rarer nocturnal lemurs. We were successful in finding one of the best finds from this tour, the **Coquerel's Giant Mouse Lemur!** This rare species was a lifer for everyone present except for the local guide, and are only active in the later hours of the night. The cryptic lemur gave us several epic views at close range, before it leaped off into the forest.

Antananarivo

After Kirindy we had an afternoon of free time in the capital city so we visited the local city park, Tsarasona. Our goal was to do some general birding with a few key targets in mind. During our two hours here we saw **Blue-billed Teal**, **Squacco Herons**, **Black Herons**, **Little Egrets**, and **Great Egrets**. We found two of our key endemic targets, the **Humblot's Heron** and **Malagasy Pond Heron**. A few other species present were **Malagasy Kingfisher** and **Malagasy White-eye**.

Palmarium Private Reserve

Our time in Andasibe-Mantadia was scheduled for a period of three nights in total, after the first we would leave to spend one night in Palmarium and then return for the last two nights in Andasibe. The whole point of visiting the Palmarium Private Reserve is to see the famous Aye-Aye Island. We took a boat to the main hotel and then another boat to the actual Aye-Aye Island as it was getting dark. It didn't take long before we had a pair of **Aye-Ayes (*Photo by David*)** at close range feeding on the coconuts. It was an incredible experience to see these rare lemurs at close range and unbothered by our presence. On the walk back to the boat we found another nocturnal lemur, the **Greater Dwarf Lemur**. It was a great way to end our time here.



Andasibe-Mantadia National Park

During our days in Andasibe-Mantadia we visited several reserves; Analamazoatra, V.O.I.M.A.A., and Mantadia National Park. In Analamazoatra we saw two of Madagascar's most iconic animals, the **Indri** and the **Diademed Sifaka**. We also picked up birds like **Frances's Sparrowhawk**, **Collared Nightjar**, and **Blue Coua**. V.O.I.M.A.A. had species like **Madagascar Crested Ibis**, **Common Brown Lemurs**, and **Madagascar Rainforest Scops-Owl**.

Our full day in Mantadia National Park was one of the tour's highlights. After a few hours of driving into the national park we entered the forest and immediately found the charismatic **Black-and-white- Ruffed Lemur** (*Photo below by David*). We watched for several minutes as a pair of the **Black-and-white Ruffed Lemurs** chaotically leaped



from branch to branch over our heads. Shortly after we came across the colorful **Baron's Mantella**, a bright green black and orange endemic frog. The mantellas are Madagascar's version of the neotropic dart frogs, so they are equally stunning! **Red-bellied Lemurs** were found later on in the day, our last diurnal lemur target for the area. We managed to see several key birds as well like **Crossley's Vanga**, **Short-legged Ground Roller**, **Madagascar Owl**, **Madagascar Blue Pigeon**, **Pitta-like Ground Roller**, **Nuthatch-Vanga**, and **Nelicourvi Weaver**.

On the final morning we revisited Analamazoatra, during our time we came across a few of the remaining targets. Our first noteworthy find was a **Red-breasted Coua**, though it was less than accommodating and not everyone got to see it. We had some more encounters with Indri and Diademed Sifaka, which was a nice way to say farewell to Madagascar's primates. To end the final morning before heading back to Tana we had epic views of a male **Velvet Asity**. This was our final bird we needed to see a member of the five endemic bird families, and it certainly did not disappoint us.

The night hikes were done on all three nights. We struggled to see all our nocturnal lemur targets but we did see **Goodman's Mouse Lemur** and an **Eastern Woolly Lemur!** The first night hike gave us an awesome view of **Webb's Tuft-tailed Rat**, an endemic genus of Malagasy rodents.


