

This year again, I spent about 3 weeks in the USA in July for work. I took this opportunity to visit the Denver area since I was there for a Sales meeting in the very nice town of Estes Park. My wife and I visited the nearby Rocky Mountain National Park for a day and a half and afterwards, we drove south to Boulder and then to Mount Evans for another day. Before taking our plane back to Boston we stopped by the Denver zoo to look for thirteen-lines ground squirrels but we failed to see them.

The Rocky Mountain National Park is really a beautiful park with many different landscapes: forests, alpine fields and lakes and is quite rich in wildlife. We always entered the park very early in the morning, which was the best time to see most of the wildlife since in July it was only quiet at that moment before hundreds (if not thousands) of cars and other visitors also came into park. I was amazed to even experience traffic jams along the main road during mid-day! Mount Evans was another great place to visit and indeed a great place for mountain goats that are easy to see there. The tared road up to the top is very scenic as we drive through the forest, along a few beautiful lakes and the Rocky Mountains chain view on the top is simply gorgeous, especially early morning with the rising sun. Here also, there were a lot of people during the week end and going there early morning to see mammals is highly recommended. We visited all the Denver area on our own with a rental car, which was very easy thanks to all the information we could find on Mammal Watching.

When we came back to Buffalo – Albany - Boston for the rest of my business trip and our second weekend in the USA, we went back to the Trustom Pond wildlife refuge that we already visited a few years ago. We had a fairly good experience on our first visit but that weekend in July, the weather was incredibly hot and except for a few eastern cottontails, Eastern chipmunks and white-tailed deers early in the morning, the park was “deadly” quiet. We even had to leave the park earlier that wat we planned because there were literally thousands of annoying mosquitos and flies that prevented us from enjoying calmly the place. We then drove to Cape Cod and Mashpee to look for New England Cottontails. Indeed, based on a Jon’s trip there in 2013 where it was written that “*Matt had heard that Eastern Cottontails are not present in the Mashpee area in Cape Cod so any rabbit should be one of the New England flavor*” I said to myself that we should give a try.

From the observations we made there in July 2019, I can say that this is apparently no longer true and that Eastern cottontails are now in Mashpee. We observed 4 rabbits on the same late afternoon in people’s lawns on Surf Drive in Mashpee and to me, one was clearly an Eastern cottontail given the white spot on its forehead. I can’t really say for two other rabbits but I’m pretty sure the fourth one had all the New England Cottontail diagnostics: no white spot on the forehead, a dark spot between the ears and black leading edges to the ears.

The rest of our weekend in Cape Cod was spent to drink piña colada and eat lobsters ☺ and do a couple of whale watching trips from Provincetown in order to escape from the insanely hot temperature on those days. We really enjoyed the boat cruises as usual even if we didn’t see anything exceptional besides the usual suspects like humpback whales, fin whales and Minke whales.


